

HISTORY CORNER

The California Missions Foundation (CMF), The Corredor Historico CAREM and a number of other interested organizations on each side of our southern border are proceeding to develop an application to establish a bi-national World Heritage designation for the El Camino de las Californias corridor. This corridor is envisioned as extending from the tip of Baja California Sur to the Sonoma site of the last of the 21 missions established in Nueva California.

The process will be extensive since the route linked Missions, Presidios, Asistencias, Pueblos and some Spanish Ranchos. The corridor is to consider the cultural, historical, and urban centers and natural landscapes and ecosystems on both sides of the border. The President of the CMF is Milford Wayne Donaldson, and those who worked with him when he was the State Historical Preservation Officer know it will be a thorough study.

One of the first tasks of the effort is to establish the corridor for the study. This will not be as easy as it sounds. For example, the recent Caltrans El Camino Real Mission Bells Marker Project placed about 585 bells along non-interstate State Routes 101, 82, 37, 121 and 12; however, not all of the bells were placed along the actual El Camino Real as utilized by the Spanish since nine of the 21 Missions (including three on Interstate Route 5) are not served by the placed bells. These include the first three established Missions at San Diego, Monterey and Mission San Antonio.

But that is an old story. Of more current interest is that on January 12, 2017 from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. there will be a workshop on the El Camino Real Public History Research Project at the San Diego History Center in Balboa Park, San Diego. The focus of this meeting is to learn about the initiative for the El Camino Real de las Californias as a World Heritage Site and what is needed to support the effort. I plan to attend the meeting and may be asked to briefly describe the Caltrans Bell Project.

A future roll for some of you, if you are interested and willing, may be to help establish the corridor to be presented in the proposal.

Snapshot in Time

The following day Saturday, September 24th, we gathered with cousin **Reverdy Wright** at C. H.



On a sad note, **Marilyn Johnson**, a **QCC Honorary Member** has passed away. I do not have a date of her passing.

Jack Kassel, QCC Honorary Member

After suffering a severe stroke in 2014, **Jack Kassel** passed away peacefully on April 8, 2016 surrounded by his loving family. He was 91. Born on March 18, 1925 in Chicago, Illinois, he grew up there until age ten when his family moved to Van Nuys, CA. He later moved to Carmichael, CA where he has resided for 53 years. He served in the U.S. Marine Corp in WWII as an Air Crewman in the South Pacific. After the war, he worked for the

L.A. Dept. of Water and Power on a survey crew for several years. In June of 1949 he married Ann Claussner and began raising his family of three children in Tarzana, CA. In Dec. 1950, he began his career with the California Division of Hwys/Caltrans in Los Angeles. He worked in Surveying, Construction, Traffic and Design and later became a District Traffic Engineer. In 1957, he received his Civil Engineering Degree from UCLA. In 1963, he was promoted to Headquarters Traffic Dept. in Sacramento and moved his family to Carmichael, California where he has since resided. He became Division Chief of Caltrans Headquarters and headed Traffic Engineering as well as other departments. He retired in 1985 after 33 years of distinguished service with the CA Dept. of Transportation as Chief of Project Development where he represented CA as a member of the American Assn. of State Highway Transportation Officials working for better and safer highways throughout America. He was warmly received and highly respected by his colleagues. He held California licenses in Civil Engineering and Traffic Engineering and was active for many years in the Institute of Traffic Engineers. Jack was an active member of St. John the Evangelist Parish where he served as lector and on many of the annual festival and fund raising committees.

Dave Crane, QCC Honorary Member

David Aaron Crane, 91, died peacefully at home in Fair Oaks, CA on April 19, 2016. He was born to David Lester and **Margaret Elizabeth Crane** on February 22, 1925 in Seattle, WA. Dave was raised with two brothers, **Jim and Bill**, on a dairy farm in Castle Rock, WA. He is a decorated WWII veteran, having received the Bronze Star while serving with the 101st Airborne in the Battle of Bulge in Bastogne, Belgium in the winter of 1944-45. After service in Belgium and France, his division chased the retreating German army across southern Germany until Hitler surrendered in May 1945. He trained with the 82nd Airborne Division to paratroop onto mainland Japan, and was spared when the war in the Pacific ended in September

1945. **Dave** marched in the Victory Parade down 5th Avenue in New York City on January 12, 1946. After the war, Dave attended Lower Columbia College in Longview, WA, where he played football wearing a leather helmet. He graduated from the University of Idaho in Civil Engineering and became a highway engineer for the State of California in 1951 in Bishop, CA. Later that year, he met his beloved wife of 64 years, Elizabeth Garrigues, and they were married 10 months later.

Following 8 years in Bishop, he worked for Caltrans in San Luis Obispo, CA from 1959 to 1968, and in Sacramento, CA from 1969 to 1988, retiring in 1988 as a Supervising Highway Engineer. Over that time, he worked in Right of Way, Planning, Design, Construction Maintenance. Dave enjoyed hunting, fishing, golfing, skiing, windsurfing, gardening and beach bumming. He was a member of 101st Airborne Division Association-Northern California Chapter, SIRS, Quarter Century Club, and Trinity Episcopal Church in Folsom, CA...
