History of California Missions By Historian George E. Gray

In the September/October 1944 Issue of the *California Highway and Public Works Magazine* [CH&PW] then editor Kenneth C. Adams published the first of eleven articles titled "California Missions." These were quite comprehensive and covered all 21 of the Franciscan missions in the state. The articles included the condition of the missions at that time.

Perhaps it is best to quote from the "Mission Meccas" presented as an introductory sidebar to all eleven articles.

"California's famous old missions with their historical and romantic background annually attract thousands of visitors. Twenty-one Franciscan missions were founded by Reverend Fray Junipero Serra and his colleagues, extending from San Diego to Sonoma. On his way north from San Diego, Father Serra and the mission padres who came after him followed a course which became known as El Camino Real, "The King's Highway." El Camino Real retains to this day its original name and is designated U.S. 101. Along this highway and short distances from it, the founding padres established their missions. U.S. 101, the old "King's Highway," now extends from the Mexican border into northern Washington.

Present day State highways lead to all the mission sites. When the war is ended and California again welcomes tourists from all over the world and there are no longer restrictions on automobile travel, it is believed that the missions will be popular meccas for visitors to the Golden State.

Anticipating this traffic, the Division of Highways will publish in California Highways and Public Works brief histories of the missions with direction on how to reach them over State highways." - Excerpt from **CH&PW**, September/October 1944 Issue

The issues involved go up to May/June 1946. They can be found at many of the major libraries in the state as well as the Caltrans HQ Library. I have a set of the eleven articles and can share individual reports on particular missions upon receipt of any requests.

As a child I spent several summers with my Grandparents in the high mountains of California. **Jack Nelson** was a fireman on a donkey engine some miles up the Tuolumne River working for the Westside Lumber Co. with the mill at Tuolumne City. Our only access to the logging camp was by narrow gauge railroad on a logging car or sometimes by caboose. We lived alongside the tracks in a portable cabin which was moved on a logging car whenever the camp site was moved. The engine was a narrow gauge Shay, articulated and geared for mountain work.

These summer visits ceased before 1930 as I had reached school age and things changed. Soon High School, UC, War, Military Service and Marriage, kids and the California Division of Highways. My highway career began in District 3 and ended 30 years later in District 6. My Shay Railroad Engine had never missed my absence and continued hauling logs until the war stopped the logging and the steel rails were sent to Japan who made good use of them. With no rails to run on my engine languished in a Stockton junk yard until an entrepreneur decided to start a mountain resort train ride near Sugarpine on State Highway 41 near Yosemite National Park. Among the obstacles he then faced was the size and weight of moving this locomotive to the new site over California highways. I at the time supervised the District 6 permit section, so got involved in the

permit to allow the move. I now live in Ahwahnee about 15 miles from Sugarpine and frequently visit my old friend from 1925!"
