### <u>The City of Palmdale's Singing</u> <u>Highway</u>

The City of Palmdale celebrated the grand opening of a musical road on 11-16-2023, at 11:10 a.m. at the northwest corner of Sierra Highway and Ave. N, commonly known as BJ's Corner. The 2,500-foot-long musical road is located on the eastbound side of R. Lee Ermey Ave. (Ave. N) between Amargosa Wash and Division St. The road will "play" 30 seconds of

the Marine's Hymn by driving over the grooved pavement at 45 mph.

The location was selected to honor **R. Lee** "Gunny" Ermey, who was not only a decorated Marine but also a tireless humanitarian. An actor, patriot, humanitarian, and, most importantly, a

family man, Ermey honorably served in the United States Marine Corps from 1961 through 1972. Until his passing on April 12, 2018, he was diligently supporting his country and Marines at events and appearances. Gunny is the only Marine to have been brought out of retirement and promoted. In 2002, Marine Corps Commandant James L. Jones promoted Ermey to E-7, Gunnery Sergeant, the rank he portrayed in the movie "Full Metal Jacket." (click on it)

President "We are excited to see this project reach completion in time to celebrate the Marine Corps 248th Birthday," said

Palmdale Mayor Laura Bettencourt. "The musical road has always been a part of the plan to honor R. Lee Ermey and all veterans. We are excited and proud that it is open for everyone to enjoy. Every time someone drives this section of road, it will serve as a tribute to him, his beloved Marine Corps, and all those who serve."

The cities of Palmdale and Lancaster, as well as the County of Los Angeles and Caltrans, unanimously decided in 2018 to create a permanent tribute to Gunny by renaming Ave. N, a major east/west roadway, R. Lee Ermey Ave. He and his family lived just off Ave. N for 24 years. This project aims to promote tourism in the Antelope Valley by providing a fun destination for people to experience. The musical road was installed by San Bar Construction, one of only two vendors in the U.S. that specializes in engineering the intermittent grooves, similar to rumble strips on roadways, that will play music.

Here's how to get it posted on the Quarter Century Club website: Write your story in an email and send it to: post+speedreportsjs@coffeecup.com Your story is then transmitted to the CTQCC website where it is stored in a folder accessible only by the webmaster, who then extracts the text and pictures you sent and stores them in a private folder on the Stories page of the Caltrans District specified by you. The webmaster then sends you an email with a link to the page containing your story, accessible only by you and the webmaster. You can then view your story on the Internet, make any changes you would like, then send them in an email just as you sent the original.

The webmaster then notifies you by email when the changes have been made. When you are satisfied with the web page containing your story, send an email to the same email authorizing the webmaster to post the story for public viewing. You can still add to or make changes to the story as described above after it is published by sending an email to the same email. Let us hear from you!

# The Haps in District 3

Hello everyone, are you enjoying our wonderful wet weather? It's been raining hard for the last few days and of course snowing up on 80 and 50. Roads are open, then closed. This weather reminds me (Jan Johnson) of what was going on in February 1986.

On February 20, 1986, I had worked my regular shift at Central Region, Special Crews, in Marysville. Then stopped, picked up a little dinner and headed to the District Office to work a shift in dispatch. At about 6:10 PM, we heard over the radio "We have a major levee break in Linda".

I called Yuba County Emergency Services to verify and get the exact location of the break. About the same time, my Region Manager, **S.A. Dorman** and Area Superintendent **Jim Howard** came to the DO. Needless to say we had an exciting night. The levee break happened behind P.V. Ranch and Home, Caltrans Marysville Maintenance yard and Shop 3. Within the next hour or so, one of our local construction companies had trucks running across the E Street bridge (Hwy 70), down to the levee and dumping rocks. Hwy 70 was totally blocked with flood water and mud. Things started to slow down about 1 AM, if one could say it was slowing down.

I stayed on working until 8 AM on the 21<sup>st</sup>. Checked in with the Region Office, then went home to catch a little sleep. I went back to the office at 5:30 that evening and worked 12-hour night shifts for the next 6 weeks or so at the Region Office. After the water receded, I was able to go out to Marysville Maintenance and Shop 3 with Bill Trexler, Roseville Supervisor and saw the water and mud damage. Watched the pumping operation at Algodon Slough, pumping water out of the flooded area into Bear River. We had several maintenance men working up on I-80 and their personal vehicles were parked at Marysville Maintenance. Their vehicles were covered with mud, wood pallets and a few dead ducks. This was an experience that I wouldn't trade with anyone.

### <u>The following is from an article from Yuba</u> <u>County – Get Out and Explore</u>

On this date 38 years ago in Yuba County history (February 20, 1986), the '86 flood inundated as many as 4,000 homes and forced about 26,000 residents to evacuate Linda, Olivehurst and Arboga. Two deaths and \$200 million in damages resulted. A state court settlement in 2005 paid out nearly half a billion dollars. Since then, over \$500 million has been spent in Yuba County to create a state-of-the-art setback levee and improve the engineering and durability of the levee system to certified 100-year flood protection.

Record flooding occurred in three streams that drain to the southern part of the San Francisco Bay area. Extensive flooding occurred in the Napa and Russian rivers. Napa, north of San Francisco, recorded their worst flood to this time while nearby Calistoga recorded 29 inches of rain in 10 days, creating a once-in-a-thousand-year rainfall event. Per Wikipedia.org; SIERRA - 9 records for a 24-hour rain event were reported in the Central Valley and in the Sierra. A one thousand-year rainfall was recorded in the Sierras. The heaviest 24-hour rainfall ever recorded in the Central Valley at 17.60 inches on February 17 at Four Trees in the Feather River Basin. In Sacramento, nearly 10 inches of rain fell in an 11-day period. System breaks in the Sacramento River basin included disastrous levee breaks in the Olivehurst and Linda area on the Yuba River. Linda, about 40 miles north of Sacramento, was devastated after the levee broke on the Yuba River' south fork, forcing thousands of residents to evacuate. In the San Joaquin River basin and the Delta, levee breaks along the Mokelumne River caused flooding in the community of Thorton and the inundation of four Delta islands. Lake Tahoe rose 6 inches as a result of high inflow.

The California flood resulted in 13 deaths, 50,000 people evacuated and over \$400 million in property damage. 3,000 residents of Linda joined in a class action lawsuit Paterno v. State of California, which eventually reached the California Supreme Court in 2004. The California high court affirmed the District Court of Appeal's decision the said California was liable for millions of dollars in damages.

### Mike "Brudda" Rodrigues By Gordon Analla

He was almost always the first person in the yard. He unlocked the gate and cruised in with his sharp looking 68 Pontiac. Not tall in stature but huge in heart, strength, and character. Black wavy hair, and a goatee. He had a ready smile, a great laugh, and a sense of humor. He liked things done his way and was given free rein to do so on the Bridge Crew in the Potrero Yard of the San Francisco Region, District 04.

My fellow co-worker and friend **Erich**, and I often worked together as Landscapers in the San Francisco Region. One of our areas was the Highway 280 on and off ramps. We were doing our routine maintenance and cleanup when we noticed that there was clothing and possibly some homeless squatting going on under the bridge structure. The structure started at ground level and then proceeded up until it became the bridge. There was a crawlspace that could have someone sleeping/living there. This was in the early 80's

when the homeless situation wasn't as intense as it is now.

**Mike** just happened to be in the area, and we flagged him down. We told him about the crawl space and our concerns. Mike didn't hesitate. He parked his bridge truck and followed us to the site, flashlight in hand. He got down to the ground and said in his Hawaiian raised Puerto Rican ancestry accent, "I got's to go in there Brudda."

I don't think either of us had confined spaces training. I don't know if it was a requirement *\*more on that later.* So, Mike laid down on his back and literally scooted on the dirt to get a better read if anyone was living there. That was the type of person he was. A caring individual. Not afraid to get dirty. And he did, as we observed transfixed as it were. After a few minutes, he emerged and the plan was for him to report to his Supervisor, **Dave Hartley** (another great guy), the need to fence/block off access to the area. Both for the homeless safety and for the protection of the structure's integrity.

I learned a great deal from **Mike**. Both through observation and osmosis. I took advice he gave me seriously. Wherever I was loaned out to the Bridge Crew, I knew he had my back and would keep an eye out for me. He showed me different ways that were ergonomically correct, ahead of its time, to keep me from being injured and/or tiring out.

Mike wasn't the type to talk himself up. He didn't complain either. Often times, when lane closures were put in on the busy Bay Area highways of 80 and 101, a person had to work through lunch. Just grab a quick bite in the truck and then back at it before the traffic got worse. He did his job to the best of his ability. He didn't seek praise or recognition. He did what he did in a great way.

I never got the chance to say good-bye to him. When he retired there was no party. He walked out the door, unannounced. It prompted me to write a one act play about him and a combination of others that I knew at Caltrans.

### He is missed. RIP Mike.

I can honestly speak for the three of us, in that we didn't have confined spaces training. Had we, Mike wouldn't have gone into and under the structure. It definitely hit the criteria of a confined space. Thankful that nothing transpired with Mike in there as I am sure either Erich or I would have gone into the area to try and get him out. That could have proved to be fatal regardless of our good intentions.

### **About Gravel Roads**

### From *California Highways*, September 1924 Submitted by **Mike Ogilvie** (From *Western Highways Builder*)

A two-week's journey over the Pacific Highway and several important tributary roads from San Diego, California to Seattle, Washington, leads to the conclusion that the properly built, efficiently maintained gravel-surfaced road is as satisfactory a type of construction as any rational individual could ask for.

The Western Association of State Highway Officials recognizes the pertinent fact that this type of road will carry the majority of the traffic in the public land states for some time to come and has appointed a committee to investigate and report on successful methods of construction and maintenance.

To this committee I would suggest a trip over the Pacific Highway from Sisson to the Oregon state line where **Robert Morton** has created a high-speed, albeit gravel boulevard from a most uncomfortable and treacherous stretch of road.

This section of the California state highway system is carrying 1200 to 1500 vehicles a day without serious difficulty. In Oregon, a similarly fast road has been built between Medford and the boundary of Crater Lake National Park and between Klamath Falls and the Pacific Highway, by the Oregon highway commission. These three roads permit a speed, with comfort and safety, of 35 to 45 miles an hour. Little more could be asked for.
